## 2.1 Use definition – intended use

### (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)

This vehicle has been designed and built to withstand the normal stresses and strains of offroad leisure use.



#### Info

This vehicle is homologated and approved for use on public roads.  
No homologation-relevant components may be removed or modified.

### (FE 350w US)

This vehicle has been designed and built to withstand the normal stresses and strains of offroad leisure use. Additionally, it fulfills the **CARB (California Air Resources Board)** guidelines of the **Green Sticker** program.



#### Info

This vehicle is not approved for use on public roads.  
No homologation-relevant components may be removed or modified.  
This vehicle is not designed for use in racing on closed circuits or for Motocross use.

## 2.2 Misuse

The vehicle must only be used as intended.

Dangers can arise for people, property and the environment through use not as intended.

Any use of the vehicle beyond the intended and defined use constitutes misuse.

Misuse also includes the use of operating and auxiliary fluids which do not meet the required specification for the respective use.

## 2.3 Safety advice

A number of safety instructions need to be followed to operate the product described safely. Therefore read this instruction and all further instructions included carefully. The safety instructions are highlighted in the text and are referred to at the relevant passages.

Various information and warning labels are attached in prominent locations on the product described. Do not remove any information or warning labels. If they are missing, you or others may not recognize dangers and may therefore be injured.

### 2.4 Degrees of risk and symbols



#### **Danger**

### 2.5 Tampering warning

Tampering with the noise control system is prohibited. Federal law prohibits the following acts or the causing thereof:

- 1 The removal or rendering inoperative by any person other than for purposes of servicing, repair, or replacement, of any device or element of design incorporated into any new vehicle for the purpose of noise control prior to its sale or delivery to the ultimate purchaser or while it is in use, or
- 2 the use of the vehicle after such device or element of design has been removed or rendered inoperative by any person.

Among those acts presumed to constitute tampering are the acts listed below:

- 1 Removal or puncturing of the main silencers, baffles, manifolds or any other components which conduct emissions.
- 2 Removal or puncturing of parts of the intake system.
- 3 Lack of proper maintenance.
- 4 Replacing moving parts of the vehicle, or parts of the exhaust system or intake system, with parts other than those specified by the manufacturer.

#### **(FE 350w US)**

An add-on or modified part must be compliant with applicable ARB evaporative emission control standards. A violation of this requirement is punishable by civil and/or criminal punishment.

### 2.6 Safe operation



#### **Danger**

**Danger of accidents** A rider who is not fit to ride poses a danger to him or herself and others.

- Do not operate the vehicle if you are not fit to ride due to alcohol, drugs or medication.
- Do not operate the vehicle if you are physically or mentally impaired.

**Danger**

**Danger of poisoning** Exhaust gases are toxic and inhaling them may result in unconsciousness and death.

- Always make sure there is sufficient ventilation when running the engine.
- Use effective exhaust extraction when starting or running the engine in an enclosed space.

**Warning**

**Danger of burns** Some vehicle components become hot when the vehicle is operated.

- Do not touch any parts such as the exhaust system, radiator, engine, damper, or brake system before the vehicle parts have cooled down.
- Let the vehicle parts cool down before you perform any work on the vehicle.

Only operate the vehicle when it is in perfect technical condition, in accordance with its intended use, and in a safe and environmentally compatible manner.

The vehicle should only be used by trained persons. An appropriate driver's license is needed to drive the vehicle on public roads.

Have malfunctions that impair safety immediately eliminated by an authorized Husqvarna Motorcycles workshop.

Adhere to the information and warning labels on the vehicle.

## 2.7 Protective clothing

**Warning**

**Risk of injury** Missing or poor protective clothing presents an increased safety risk.

- Wear appropriate protective clothing such as helmet, boots, gloves as well as trousers and a jacket with protectors on all rides.
- Always wear protective clothing that is in good condition and meets the legal regulations.

In the interest of your own safety, Husqvarna Motorcycles recommends that you only operate the vehicle while wearing protective clothing.

## 2.8 Work rules

Unless specified otherwise, the ignition must be turned off during all work (models with ignition lock, models with transponder key) or the motor must be at a standstill (models without ignition lock or transponder key).

Special tools are necessary for certain tasks. The tools are not a component of the vehicle, but can be ordered using the number in parentheses. Example: bearing puller (15112017000)

Unless otherwise noted, normal conditions apply to all tasks and descriptions.

During assembly, use new parts to replace parts which cannot be reused (e.g. self-locking screws and nuts, expansion screws, seals, sealing rings, O-rings, pins, and lock washers).

In the case of certain screws, a screw adhesive (e.g. **Loctite**®) is required. Observe the manufacturer's instructions.

If thread locker (e.g., **Precote**®) has already been applied to a new part, do not apply any additional thread locker.

After disassembly, clean the parts that are to be reused and check them for damage and wear. Change damaged or worn parts.

After completing a repair or service work, check the operating safety of the vehicle.

### 2.9 Environment

If you use your motorcycle responsibly, you can ensure that problems and conflicts do not occur. To protect the future of the motorcycle sport, make sure that you use your motorcycle legally, display environmental consciousness, and respect the rights of others.

When disposing of used oil, other operating and auxiliary fluids, and used components, comply with the laws and regulations of the respective country.

Because motorcycles are not subject to the EU regulations governing the disposal of used vehicles, there are no legal regulations that pertain to the disposal of an end-of-life motorcycle. Your authorized Husqvarna Motorcycles dealer will be glad to advise you.

### 2.10 Owner's Manual

It is important that you read this Owner's Manual carefully and completely before making your first trip. The Owner's Manual contains useful information and many tips on how to operate, handle, and service your motorcycle. This is the only way to find out how best to customize the vehicle for your own use and how you can protect yourself from injury.

## 3.1 Manufacturer warranty, implied warranty

The work prescribed in the service schedule must only be carried out in an authorized Husqvarna Motorcycles workshop and confirmed in the **Husqvarna Motorcycles Dealer.net**, as otherwise all warranty claims will be void. Damage or secondary damage caused by tampering with and/or conversions on the vehicle are not covered by the manufacturer warranty.

## 3.2 Fuel, auxiliary substances



### Note

**Environmental hazard** Improper handling of fuel is a danger to the environment.

- Do not allow fuel to enter the groundwater, the soil, or the sewage system.

Use fuels and auxiliary substances in accordance with the Owner's Manual and specification.

The article numbers of some spare parts and accessory products are specified in parentheses in the descriptions. Your authorized Husqvarna Motorcycles dealer will be glad to advise you.

## 3.4 Service

A prerequisite for perfect operation and prevention of premature wear is that the service, care, and tuning work on the engine and chassis is properly carried out as described in the Owner's Manual. An incorrect suspension setting can lead to damage and breakage of chassis components.

Use of the vehicle under difficult conditions, such as on sand or on wet, dusty and muddy surfaces, can result in significantly increased wear of components, such as the drive train, brake system, air filter or suspension components. For this reason, it may be necessary to inspect or replace parts before the next scheduled service.

It is imperative that you adhere to the stipulated run-in times and service intervals. If you observe these exactly, you will ensure a much longer service life for your motorcycle.

The relevant mileage or time interval is whichever occurs first.

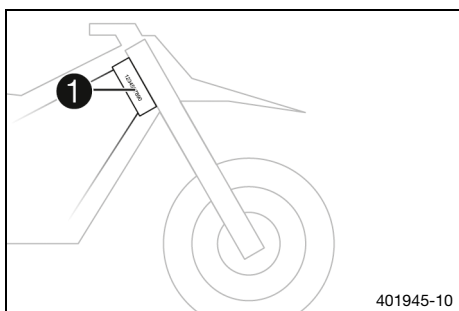

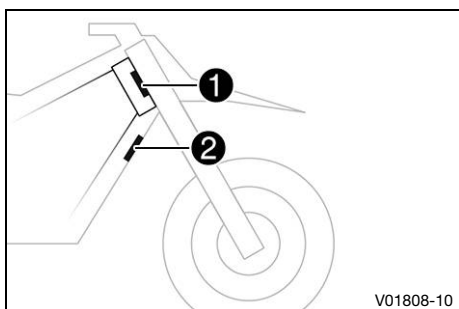
## 5 SERIAL NUMBERS

The vehicle identification number ❶ is stamped on the right side of the steering head.

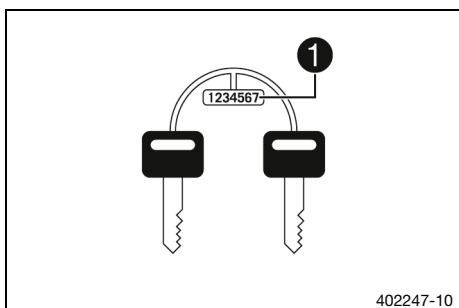
### 5.2 Type label (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)



The Europe type label ❶ is fixed to the front of the steering head.

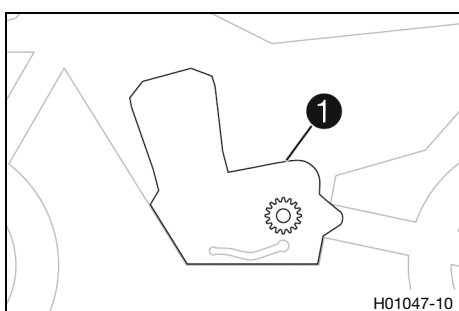
The Canada type label ❷ is fixed to the front of the chest tube.

### 5.3 Key number (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)



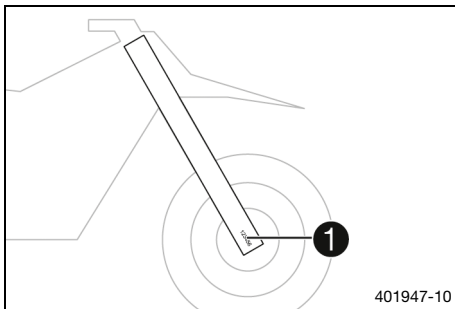
Key number ❶ for the steering lock is stamped on a tag on the key ring.

### 5.4 Engine number



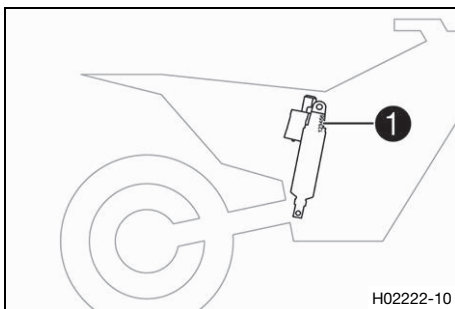
The engine number ❶ is embossed on the left side of the engine over the engine sprocket.

The fork part number ❶ is stamped on the inner side of the fork stub.

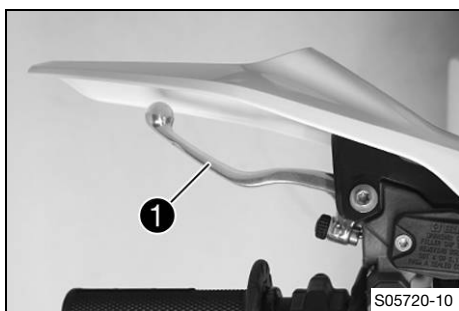
## 5.6 Shock absorber article number



Shock absorber article number ❶ is stamped on the top of the shock absorber above the adjusting ring towards the engine side.

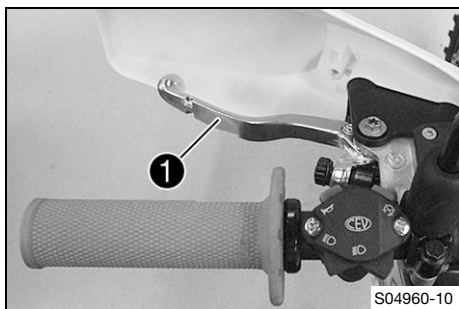
## 6 CONTROLS

### 6.1 Clutch lever

Clutch lever ❶ is fitted on the handlebar on the left.

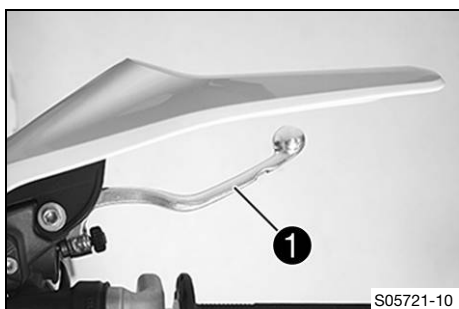


**(All special models)**

Clutch lever ❶ is fitted on the handlebar on the left.

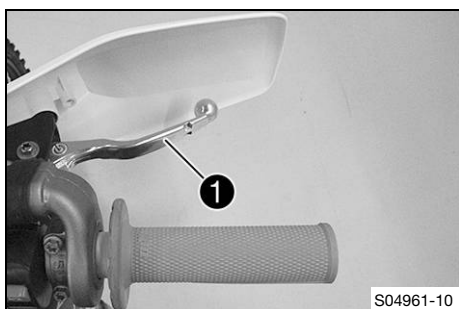
The clutch is activated hydraulically and adjusts itself automatically.

### 6.2 Hand brake lever

Hand brake lever ❶ is located on the right side of the handlebar.

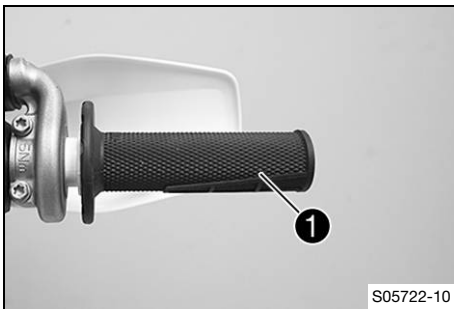


**(All special models)**

Hand brake lever ❶ is located on the right side of the handlebar.

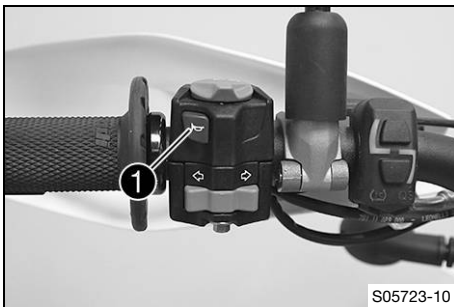
The front brake is engaged using the hand brake lever.

## 6.4 Horn button (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)

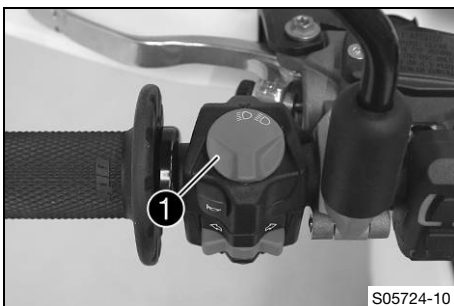


Horn button ❶ is fitted on the left side of the handlebar.

## 6.5 Light switch (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)

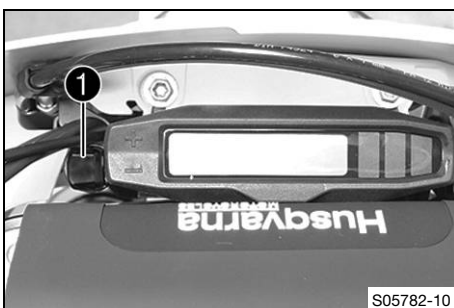


Light switch ❶ is fitted on the left side of the handlebar.

## 6.6 Light switch (FE 350w US)

6.7 Turn signal switch (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)



Turn signal switch ❶ is fitted on the left side of the handlebar.

6.8 Start button



Start button ❶ is fitted on the right side of the handlebar.

- The start button ❶ is in the basic position
- The start button ❶ is pressed – The starter motor is actuated in this position.

6.9 Stop button



The stop button ❶ is located on the right side of the handlebar.

Possible states

- The stop button ❶ is in the basic position – In this position, the ignition circuit is closed and the engine can be started.
- Stop button ❶ pressed – In this position, the ignition circuit is interrupted, a running engine stops, and a non-running engine will not start.



## 6.10 Combination switch (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)



The combination switch is fitted on the left side of the handlebar.

### Caution

**Voiding of the government approval for road use and the insurance coverage** If the combination switch is mounted, the vehicle's road permit, if any, expires.

- Only operate the vehicle in closed-off areas remote from public road traffic if the combination switch is installed.

The engine characteristic can be changed using button **1** and button **2** on the combination switch.

Traction control can be activated using the TC button **3** on the combination switch.

The quick shifter can also be activated via the combination switch.

6.13 Opening fuel tank filler cap



**Danger**

**Fire hazard** Fuel is highly flammable.

The fuel in the fuel tank expands when warm and can escape if overfilled.

- Do not fuel the vehicle in the vicinity of open flames or lit cigarettes.
- Switch off the engine for refueling.
- Make sure that no fuel is spilled; particularly not on hot parts of the vehicle.
- If any fuel is spilled, wipe it off immediately.
- Observe the specifications for refueling.



**Warning**

**Danger of poisoning** Fuel is harmful to health.

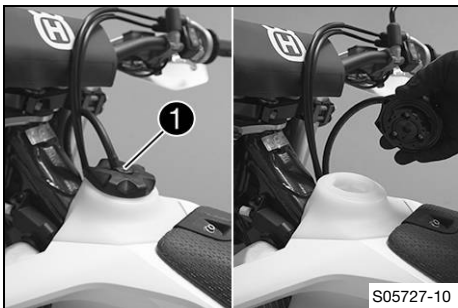
- Avoid skin, eye and clothing contact with fuel.
- Immediately consult a doctor if you swallow fuel.
- Do not inhale fuel vapors.
- Rinse the affected area immediately with plenty of water in the event of contact with the skin.
- Rinse the eyes thoroughly with water, and consult a doctor in case of fuel contact with the eyes.
- Change your clothing if fuel spills on them.
- Keep fuels correctly in a suitable canister, and out of the reach of children.

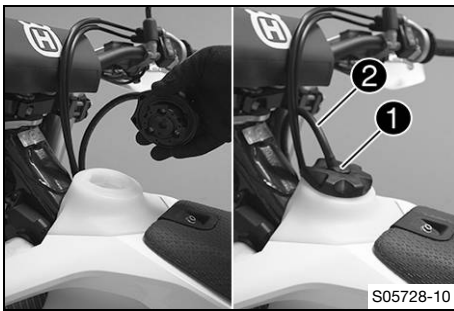

- Press release button **1**, turn the fuel tank filler cap counter-clockwise, and lift it off.

## 6.14 Closing the fuel tank filler cap



- Mount fuel tank filler cap and turn it clockwise until the release button **1** engages.

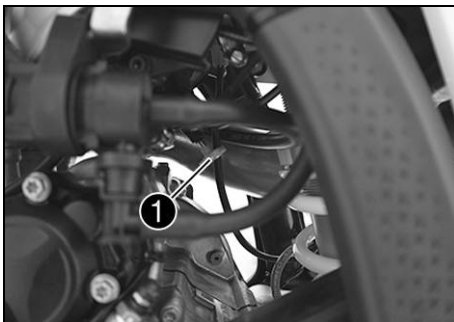

## 6.15 Cold start button



The cold start button **1** is fitted to the bottom of the throttle valve body.

The electronic fuel injection system extends the injection time if the engine is cold and the ambient temperature is low. To help the engine burn the increased fuel quantity, it must be supplied with additional oxygen by pushing the cold start button.

After briefly opening up the throttle and then releasing the throttle grip again, or turning the throttle grip towards the front, the cold start button returns to its original position.

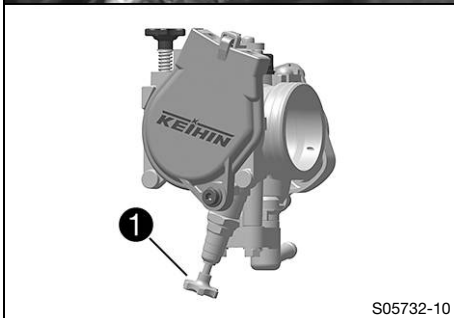

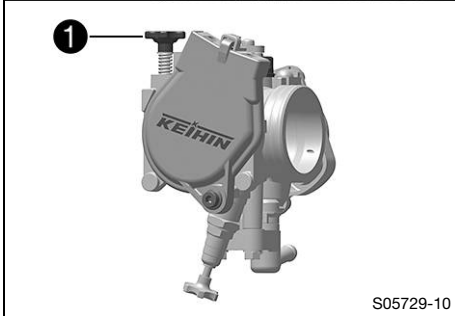
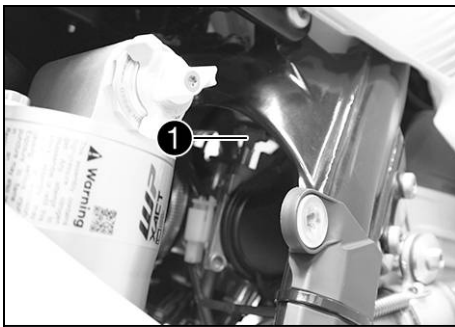
Check whether the cold start button has returned to its basic position.

## 6.16 Idle speed adjusting screw

The idle setting of the throttle valve body substantially influences the vehicle's starting behavior, a stable idle speed, and the vehicle's response when the throttle is opened.

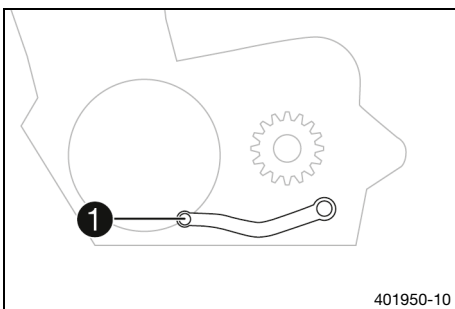
An engine with a correctly set idle speed is easier to start than an engine with the idle speed set incorrectly.

The idle speed is adjusted using the idle speed adjusting screw ①.

Increase the idle speed by turning the idle speed adjusting screw clockwise.

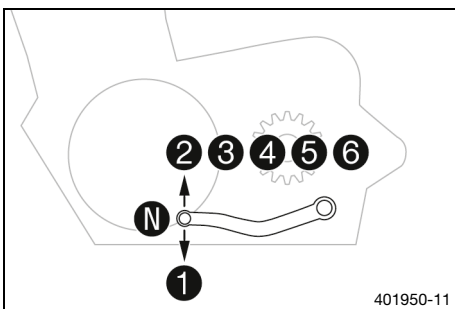
Decrease the idle speed by turning the idle speed adjusting screw counterclockwise.

## 6.17 Shift lever

Shift lever ① is mounted on the left of the engine.

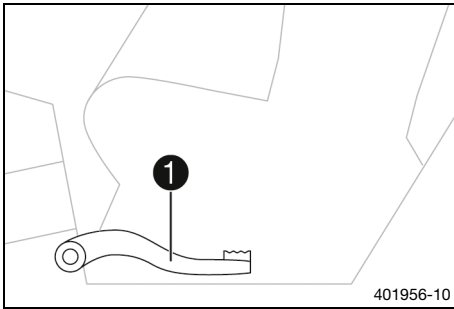

The gear positions can be seen in the figure.

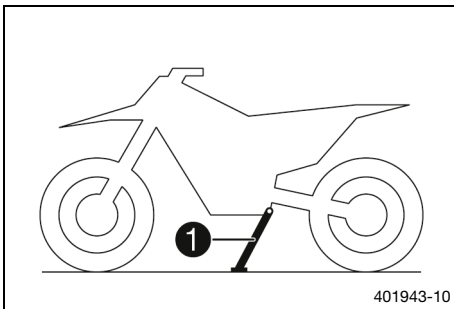
The neutral or idle position is between the first and second gears.

## 6.18 Foot brake lever

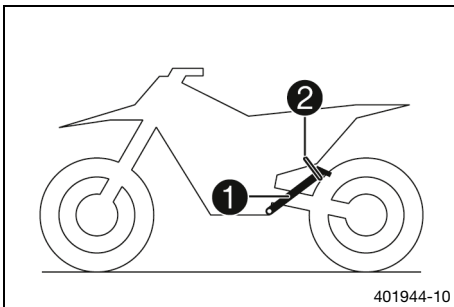


Foot brake lever ① is located in front of the right footrest. The rear brake is engaged with the foot brake lever.

## 6.19 Side stand



The side stand ① is attached to the left side of the vehicle.

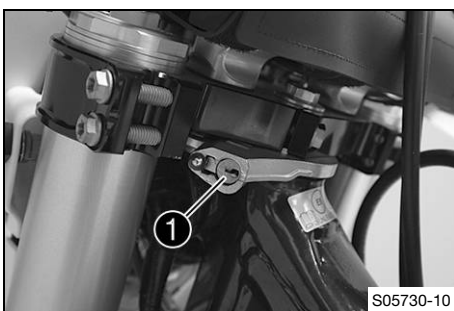


The side stand is used for parking the motorcycle.

### **i** Info

When you are riding, side stand ① must be folded up and secured with rubber strap ②.

## 6.20 Steering lock (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)



Steering lock ① is fitted on the left side of the steering head. The steering lock is used to lock the steering. Steering, and therefore riding, is no longer possible.

## 6.21 Locking the steering (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)

### Note

**Danger of damage** The parked vehicle can roll away or fall over.

- Park the vehicle on a firm and level surface.



- Park the vehicle.
- Turn handlebar as far as possible to the right.
- Lubricate the steering lock regularly.

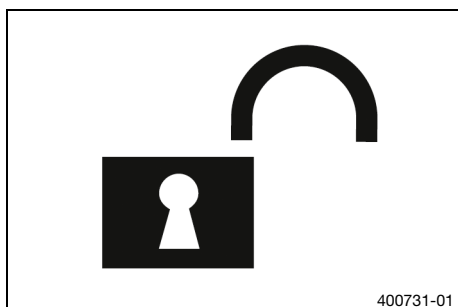
- Insert the key for the steering lock into the steering lock (📖 p. 23), turn it to the left, push it in, and turn it to the right. Pull out the key for the steering lock.

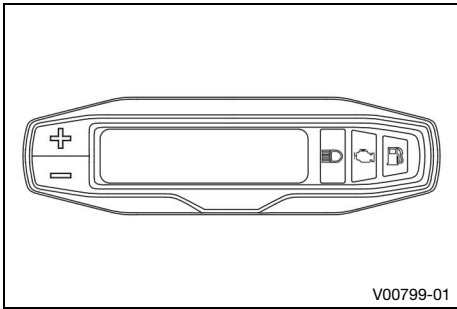

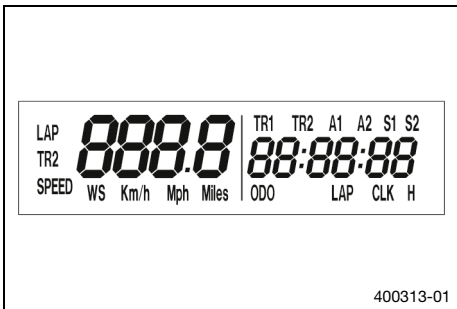
7.1 Combination instrument overview

7.2 Activation and test

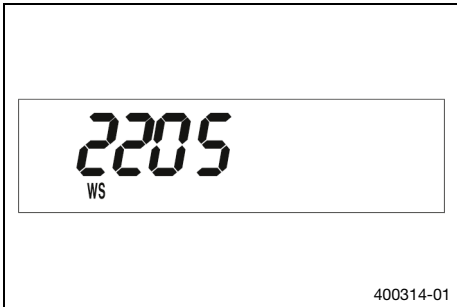


**Activating combination instrument**

The combination instrument is activated when one of the buttons is pressed or an impulse comes from the wheel speed sensor.

**Display test**

To enable you to check that the display is functioning properly, all display segments light up briefly.



**WS (wheel size)**

After the display function check, the wheel circumference **WS** is displayed briefly.

The number 2205 equals the circumference of the 21" front wheel with standard tires.

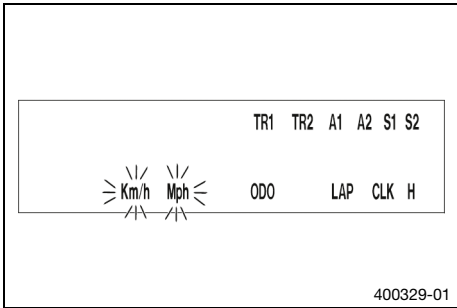
The display then changes to the last selected mode.

7.3 Setting kilometers or miles

**i Info**  
If you change the unit, the value **ODO** is retained and converted accordingly.  
The values **TR1**, **TR2**, **A1**, **A2** and **S1** are cleared when the unit of measure is changed.

**Condition**

The motorcycle is stationary.



- Repeatedly press the button briefly until **H** appears at the bottom right of the display.

## 8.1 Advice on preparing for first use



### Danger

**Danger of accidents** A rider who is not fit to ride poses a danger to him or herself and others.

- Do not operate the vehicle if you are not fit to ride due to alcohol, drugs or medication.
- Do not operate the vehicle if you are physically or mentally impaired.



### Warning

**Risk of injury** Missing or poor protective clothing presents an increased safety risk.

- Wear appropriate protective clothing such as helmet, boots, gloves as well as trousers and a jacket with protectors on all rides.
- Always wear protective clothing that is in good condition and meets the legal regulations.



### Warning

**Danger of crashing** Different tire tread patterns on the front and rear wheel impair the handling characteristic.

Different tire tread patterns can make the vehicle significantly more difficult to control.

- Make sure that only tires with a similar tire tread pattern are fitted to the front and rear wheel.



### Warning

**Danger of accidents** An unadapted riding style impairs the handling characteristic.

- Adapt your riding speed to the road conditions and your riding ability.



### Warning

**Danger of accidents** The vehicle is not designed to carry passengers.

- Do not ride with a passenger.



### Warning

**Danger of accidents** The brake system fails in the event of overheating.

If the foot brake lever is not released, the brake linings drag continuously.

- Take your foot off the foot brake lever if you do not want to brake.



### Warning

**Danger of accidents** Total weight and axle loads influence the handling characteristic.

- Do not exceed the maximum permissible overall weight or the axle loads.



### Warning

**Risk of injury** People who act without authorization may not be familiar with the vehicle.

- Do not leave the vehicle unattended if the engine is running.
- Protect the vehicle against access by unauthorized persons.



### Info

When using your motorcycle, remember that others may feel disturbed by excessive noise.

- Make sure that the pre-sale inspection work has been carried out by an authorized Husqvarna Motorcycles workshop.
  - ✓ You will receive a delivery certificate when the vehicle is handed over.
- Before riding for the first time, read the entire Owner's Manual carefully.
- Get to know the controls.
- Adjust basic position of the clutch lever. (📖 p. 91)

### (All special models)

- Adjust the free travel of the handbrake lever. (📖 p. 95)

- Get used to the handling characteristics of the motorcycle on a suitable surface before undertaking more challenging trips.



#### Info

When offroad, it is recommended that you are accompanied by another person on another vehicle so that you can help each other.

- Try also to ride as slowly as possible and in a standing position to get a better feel for the motorcycle.
- Do not make any off-road trips that exceed your ability and experience.
- Hold the handlebar firmly with both hands and keep your feet on the footrests when riding.
- If you carry any luggage, make sure you fix it firmly as close as possible to the center of the vehicle and ensure even weight distribution between the front and rear wheels.



#### Info

Motorcycles react sensitively to any changes of weight distribution.

- The maximum permissible overall weight and the maximum permissible axle loads must not be exceeded.

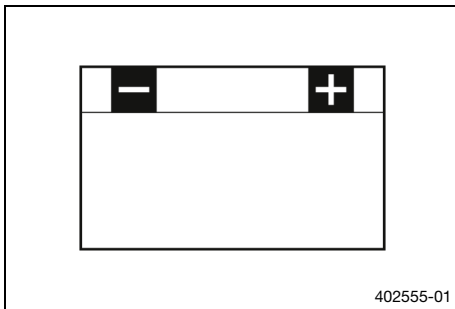

## 8.3 Starting power of lithium-ion batteries at low temperatures



Lithium-ion batteries are far lighter than lead batteries, have a low self-discharge rate, and have more starting power at temperatures over 6 °C (43 °F).

Several attempts to start may be required. Press the start button for 5 seconds, and wait 15 seconds between attempts. At low temperatures, wait for 30 seconds. The pauses are necessary so that the heat created can distribute through the lithium-ion battery and the lithium-ion battery is not damaged.

The starting power increases as the battery warms up.

Always make sure the lithium-ion battery is charged to that there is enough power to spare for starting at low temperatures.

After 6 unsuccessful starting attempts, do not try again, and check the vehicle for other errors instead.

## 8.4 Preparing the vehicle for difficult operating conditions

### **i** Info

Use of the vehicle under difficult conditions, such as on sand or on wet and muddy surfaces, can result in significantly increased wear of components, such as the drive train, brake system, or suspension components. For this reason, it may be necessary to inspect or replace parts before the next scheduled service.

- Clean the air filter and air filter box. 📖 (p. 75)

### **i** Info

Check the air filter approx. every 30 minutes.

- Check the electrical connector for humidity and corrosion and to ensure it is firmly seated.
  - » If humidity, corrosion, or damage is found:
    - Clean and dry the connector, or change it if necessary.

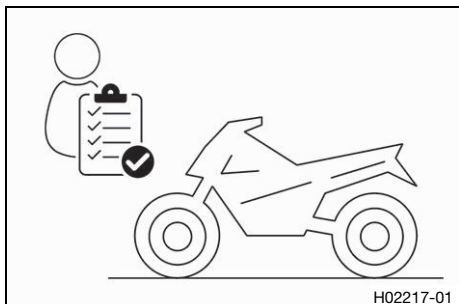


## 9.1 Checks and maintenance measures when preparing for use



### Info

Before every trip, check the condition of the vehicle and ensure that it is safe to operate. The vehicle must be in perfect technical condition when it is being operated.



- Check the engine oil level. (📖 p. 137)
- Check the electrical system.
- Check the front brake fluid level. (📖 p. 96)
- Check the rear brake fluid level. (📖 p. 103)
- Check that the brake linings of the front brake are secured. (📖 p. 98)
- Check that the brake linings of the rear brake are secured. (📖 p. 105)
- Check that the brake system is functioning properly.
- Check the coolant level. (📖 p. 127)
- Check for chain dirt accumulation. (📖 p. 83)
- Check the chain, rear sprocket, engine sprocket, and chain guide. (📖 p. 87)
- Check the chain tension. (📖 p. 84)
- Check the tire condition. (📖 p. 114)
- Check tire pressure. (📖 p. 114)
- Check the spoke tension. (📖 p. 115)



### Info

The spoke tension must be checked regularly as incorrect spoke tension will strongly impair riding safety.

- Clean the dust boots of the fork legs. (📖 p. 61)
- Bleed the fork legs. (📖 p. 60)
- Check the air filter.
- Check the settings of all controls and ensure that they can be operated smoothly.
- Check all screws, nuts, and hose clips regularly for tightness.
- Check the fuel level.

## 9.2 Starting the vehicle



### Danger

**Danger of poisoning** Exhaust gases are toxic and inhaling them may result in unconsciousness and death.

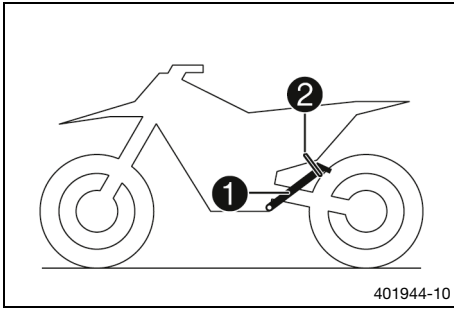
- Always make sure there is sufficient ventilation when running the engine.
- Use effective exhaust extraction when starting or running the engine in an enclosed space.

### Note

**Engine damage** High revving speed with a cold engine negatively impacts the lifespan of the engine.

- Always run the engine warm at a low speed.



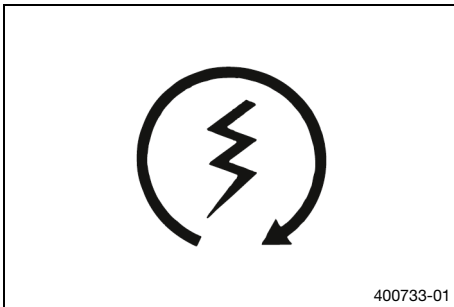


- Take the motorcycle off side stand **1** and secure the side stand with rubber strap **2**.
- Shift the transmission into neutral.

## Condition

Ambient temperature: < 20 °C (< 68 °F)

- Push the cold start button in all the way.



- Press the start button.



## Info

Press the start button for a maximum of 5 seconds. Wait for 15 seconds before a further attempt at starting.

At low temperatures, wait for 30 seconds.

At temperatures below 6 °C (43 °F), several attempts at starting may be necessary to warm-up the lithium-ion battery and thereby increase the starting power.

After 6 unsuccessful starting attempts, do not try again, and check the vehicle for other errors instead. During the starting process, the malfunction indicator lamp lights up.

## 9.3 Activating traction control (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)



## Caution

**Voiding of the government approval for road use and the insurance coverage** If the combination switch is mounted, the vehicle's road permit, if any, expires.

- Only operate the vehicle in closed-off areas remote from public road traffic if the combination switch is installed.



## Info

The traction control reduces excessive slip on the rear wheel in favor of more control and propulsion, particularly in wet conditions.

When traction control is switched off, the rear wheel may spin more during high acceleration and on surfaces with low grip.

Traction control can be switched on or off during the ride.

The setting most recently selected is activated again when restarting.



- Press button **TC** to switch the traction control on or off.

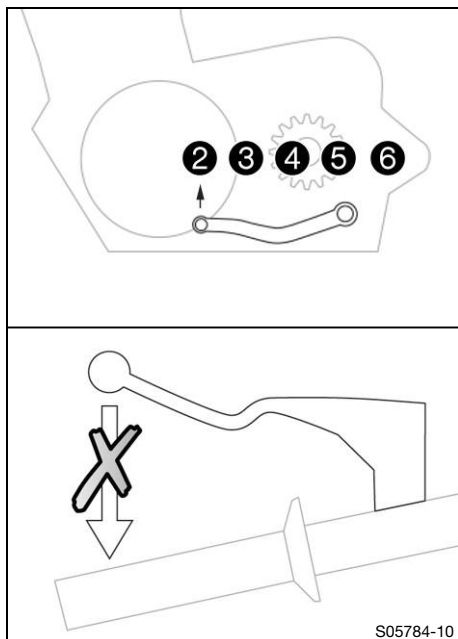
## 9.4 Starting off

### **i** Info

Switch on the light before riding the vehicle. You will be seen earlier by other motorists.  
When you are riding, the side stand must be folded up and secured with the rubber strap.

- Pull the clutch lever, shift into first-gear, release the clutch lever slowly and at the same time open the throttle carefully.

## 9.5 Quickshifter (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)



When the quickshifter is activated, you can shift up without actuating the clutch.

### **i** Info

The quickshifter is not activated when shifting up from first to second gear, and the clutch lever must be used when shifting up instead.

Even if the quickshifter is activated, you need to use the clutch lever to shift down.

Because there is no need to close the throttle grip, uninterrupted gear shifts are possible.

The quickshifter uses the shifter shaft position to check whether or not a shift should be initiated, and sends a corresponding signal to the engine control.

If the quickshifter is deactivated, the clutch needs to be actuated in the normal way for each shift.

## 9.6 Activate the quickshifter (All FE models apart from FE 350w US)



- Press the QS button **1** to switch the quickshifter on or off.
- ✓ The QS indicator lamp lights up when the quickshifter is activated.

### **i** Info

The quickshifter is not activated when shifting up from first to second gear, and the clutch lever must be used when shifting up instead.

Even if the quickshifter is activated, you need to use the clutch lever to shift down.

## 9.7 Shifting, riding



### Warning

**Danger of accidents** If you change down at high engine speed, the rear wheel blocks and the engine races.

- Do not change into a low gear at high engine speed.



### Info

If unusual noises occur while riding, stop immediately, switch off the engine, and contact an authorized Husqvarna Motorcycles workshop.

First gear is used for starting off and for steep inclines.

- Shift into a higher gear when conditions allow (incline, road situation, etc.). To do so, release the throttle while simultaneously pulling the clutch lever, shift into the next gear, release the clutch lever and open the throttle.
- After reaching maximum speed by fully opening the throttle grip, turn the throttle back so it is  $\frac{3}{4}$  open. This will barely reduce the speed, but fuel consumption will be considerably lower.
- Always open the throttle only as much as the engine can handle – abrupt throttle opening increases fuel consumption.
- To shift down, apply the brakes and close the throttle at the same time.
- Pull the clutch lever and shift into a lower gear, release the clutch lever slowly, and either open the throttle or shift again.
- Switch off the engine if running at idle speed or stationary for a long time.

Guideline

$\geq 2$  min

- Avoid frequent and lengthy slipping of the clutch. This causes the engine oil, engine and cooling system to heat up.
- Ride at a low engine speed instead of at a high engine speed with a slipping clutch.



## 9.8 Braking



### Warning

**Danger of accidents** Excessively forceful application of the brakes blocks the wheels.

- Adjust application of the brakes to the respective riding situation and riding surface conditions.



### Warning

**Danger of accidents** A spongy pressure point on the front or rear brake reduces braking efficiency.

- Check the brake system and do not continue riding until the problem is eliminated. (Your authorized Husqvarna Motorcycles workshop will be glad to help.)



### Warning

**Danger of accidents** Moisture and dirt impair the brake system.

- Brake carefully several times to dry out and remove dirt from the brake linings and the brake discs.

- On sandy, wet, or slippery surfaces, use the rear brake.
- Always finish braking before you go into a bend. Change down to a lower gear appropriate to your road speed.

- Use the braking effect of the engine on long downhill stretches. Change down one or two gears, but do not over-rev the engine. You will have to apply the brakes far less frequently as a result and the brake system will not overheat.

### 9.9 Stopping, parking



#### Warning

**Risk of injury** People who act without authorization may not be familiar with the vehicle.

- Do not leave the vehicle unattended if the engine is running.
- Protect the vehicle against access by unauthorized persons.



#### Warning

**Danger of burns** Some vehicle components become hot when the vehicle is operated.

- Do not touch any parts such as the exhaust system, radiator, engine, damper, or brake system before the vehicle parts have cooled down.
- Let the vehicle parts cool down before you perform any work on the vehicle.

#### Note

**Material damage** The vehicle may be damaged by incorrect procedure when parking.

Significant damage may be caused if the vehicle rolls away or falls over.

The components for parking the vehicle are designed only for the weight of the vehicle.

- Park the vehicle on a firm and level surface.
- Ensure that nobody sits on the vehicle when the vehicle is parked on a stand.

#### Note

**Fire hazard** Hot vehicle components pose a fire hazard and explosion risk.

- Do not park the vehicle near to materials which are highly flammable or explosive.
- Allow the vehicle to cool down before covering it.

- Apply the brakes on the motorcycle.
- Shift the transmission into neutral.
- Press and hold the stop button  while the engine is idling until the engine stops.
- Park the motorcycle on firm ground.

### 9.10 Transporting

#### Note

**Material damage** The vehicle may be damaged by incorrect procedure when parking.

Significant damage may be caused if the vehicle rolls away or falls over.

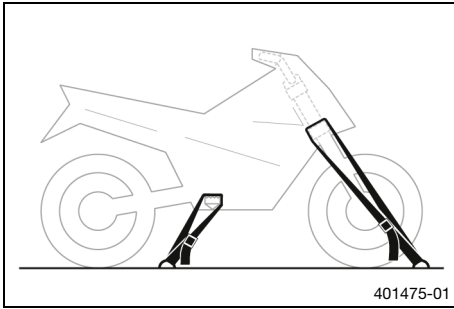
The components for parking the vehicle are designed only for the weight of the vehicle.

- Park the vehicle on a firm and level surface.
- Ensure that nobody sits on the vehicle when the vehicle is parked on a stand.

#### Note

**Fire hazard** Hot vehicle components pose a fire hazard and explosion risk.

- Do not park the vehicle near to materials which are highly flammable or explosive.
- Allow the vehicle to cool down before covering it.



- Switch off the engine.
- Use tension belts or other suitable devices to secure the motorcycle against falling over or rolling away.

## 9.11 Refueling



### Danger

**Fire hazard** Fuel is highly flammable.

The fuel in the fuel tank expands when warm and can escape if overfilled.

- Do not fuel the vehicle in the vicinity of open flames or lit cigarettes.
- Switch off the engine for refueling.
- Make sure that no fuel is spilled; particularly not on hot parts of the vehicle.
- If any fuel is spilled, wipe it off immediately.
- Observe the specifications for refueling.



### Warning

**Danger of poisoning** Fuel is harmful to health.

- Avoid skin, eye and clothing contact with fuel.
- Immediately consult a doctor if you swallow fuel.
- Do not inhale fuel vapors.
- Rinse the affected area immediately with plenty of water in the event of contact with the skin.
- Rinse the eyes thoroughly with water, and consult a doctor in case of fuel contact with the eyes.
- Change your clothing if fuel spills on them.

### Note

**Material damage** Inadequate fuel quality causes the fuel filter to quickly become clogged.

In some countries and regions, the available fuel quality and cleanliness may not be sufficient. This will result in problems with the fuel system.

- Refuel only with clean fuel that meets the specified standards. (Your authorized Husqvarna Motorcycles workshop will be glad to help.)

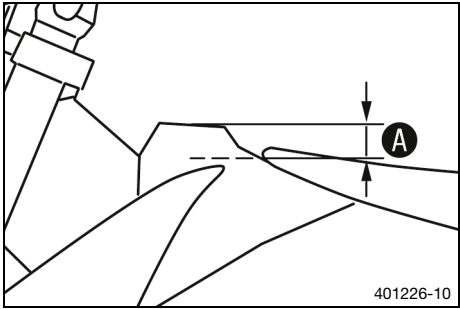

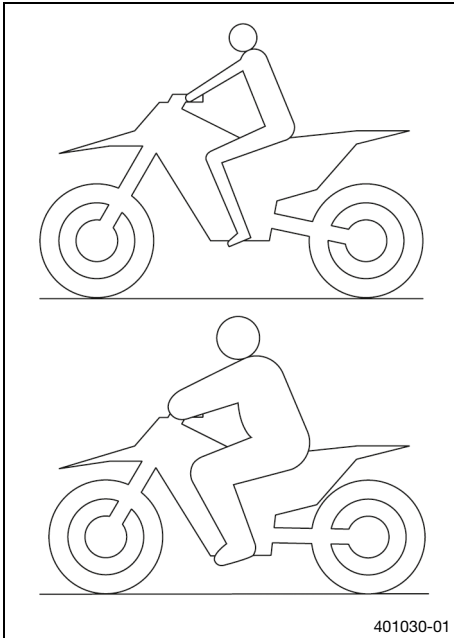

When adjusting the basic chassis setting, first adjust the shock absorber and then the fork.



- For optimal motorcycle riding characteristics and to avoid damage to forks, shock absorbers, link fork and frame, the basic settings of the suspension components must match the rider's weight.
- As delivered, Husqvarna motorcycles are adjusted for an average rider's weight (with full protective clothing).

- If the rider's weight is above or below this range, the basic setting of the suspension components must be adjusted accordingly.
- Small weight differences can be compensated by adjusting the spring preload, but in the case of large weight differences, the springs must be replaced.



## 11.2 Compression damping of the shock absorber

The compression damping of the shock absorber is divided into two ranges: high-speed and low-speed. High-speed and low-speed refer to the compression speed of the rear wheel suspension and not to the vehicle speed.

The high-speed compression adjuster has an effect, for example, when landing after a jump: the rear wheel suspension compresses quickly.

The low-speed compression adjuster has an effect, for example, when riding over long ground swells: the rear wheel suspension compresses slowly.

These two ranges can be adjusted separately, although the transition between high-speed and low-speed is gradual. Thus, modifications in the high-speed range affect the compression damping in the low-speed range and vice versa.

## 11.3 Adjusting the low-speed compression damping of the shock absorber

The spokes break due to being overloaded if they are too tightly tensioned. If the tension in the spokes is too low, then lateral and radial run-out will form in the wheel. Other spokes will become looser as a result.

- Strike each spoke briefly using a screwdriver blade.

The frequency of the sound depends on the spoke length and spoke diameter.

If you hear different tone frequencies from different spokes of equal length and diameter, this is an indication of different spoke tensions.

If the 12-V battery is left in a discharged state for an extended period, it will become deeply discharged and suffer a loss of capacity, destroying the battery.

The 12-V battery is maintenance-free.

This enables easy error detection because the status of each output is indicated via LED lights.

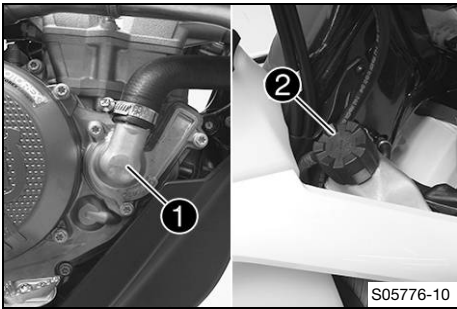

16.1 Cooling system



Water pump ❶ in the engine ensures forced circulation of the coolant.

The pressure resulting from the warming of the cooling system is regulated by a valve in radiator cap ❷. This ensures that operating the vehicle at the specified coolant temperature will not result in a risk of malfunctions.

120 °C (248 °F)

Cooling is effected by the air stream.

The lower the speed, the less the cooling effect. Dirty cooling fins also reduce the cooling effect.

Additional cooling is provided by the radiator fan, which is activated on a temperature-dependent basis.

## 18.1 Changing the fuel screen ↴



### Danger

**Fire hazard** Fuel is highly flammable.

- If any fuel is spilled, wipe it off immediately.

## 19.1 Cleaning the motorcycle

### Note

**Material damage** Components become damaged or destroyed if a pressure cleaner is used incorrectly.

The high pressure forces water into the electrical components, connectors, throttle cables, and bearings, etc. Pressure which is too high causes malfunctions and destroys components.

- Do not direct the water jet directly on to electrical components, connectors, throttle cables or bearings.
- Maintain a minimum distance between the nozzle of the pressure cleaner and the component.  
Minimum clearance 60 cm (23.6 in)

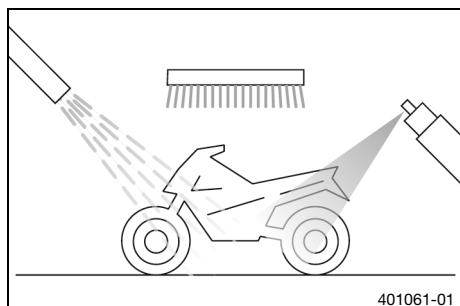
**Environmental hazard** Hazardous substances cause environmental damage.

- Dispose of oils, grease, filters, fuel, cleaning agents, brake fluid, etc., correctly and in compliance with the applicable regulations.



### Info

To maintain the value and appearance of the motorcycle over a long period, clean it regularly. Avoid direct sunshine when cleaning the motorcycle.



- Close off the exhaust system to keep water from entering.
- Remove the coarse dirt particles with a gentle water jet.
- Spray the heavily soiled parts with a normal commercial motorcycle cleaner and clean using a brush.



### Info

Use warm water containing normal motorcycle cleaner and a soft sponge. Never apply motorcycle cleaner to a dry vehicle; always rinse the vehicle with water first.

- After rinsing the motorcycle with a gentle spray of water, allow it to dry thoroughly.
- Remove the closure of the exhaust system.



### Warning

**Danger of accidents** Moisture and dirt impair the brake system.

- Brake carefully several times to dry out and remove dirt from the brake linings and the brake discs.

- After cleaning, ride the vehicle a short distance until the engine warms up.



### Info

The heat produced causes water at inaccessible locations in the engine and on the brake system to evaporate.

- After the motorcycle has cooled down, lubricate all moving parts and pivot points.
- Clean the chain. (📖 p. 83)

- Treat bare metal (except for brake discs and the exhaust system) with a corrosion inhibitor.

Preserving materials for paints, metal and rubber

- Treat all plastic parts and powder-coated parts with a mild cleaning and care product.

Special cleaner for glossy and matte paint finishes, metal and plastic surfaces (📖 p. 161)

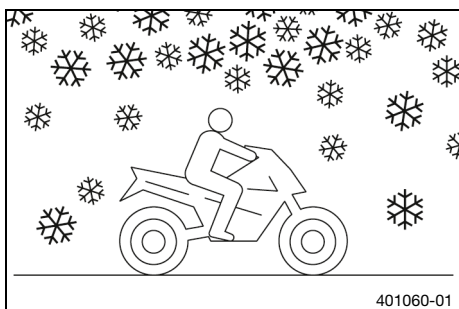

## 19.2 Checks and maintenance steps for winter operation

### **i** Info

If you use the vehicle in winter, you must expect salt on the roads. You should therefore take precautions against aggressive road salt.

If the vehicle was operated in road salt, clean it with cold water after riding. Warm water would enhance the corrosive effects of salt.



- Clean the motorcycle. (📖 p. 141)
- Clean brake system.

### **i** Info

After **EVERY** trip on salted roads, thoroughly clean the brake calipers and brake linings, after they have cooled down and without removing them, with cold water and dry them carefully.

After riding on salted roads, thoroughly clean the vehicle with cold water and dry it well.

- Treat the engine, link fork, and all other bare or zinc-plated parts (except the brake discs) with a wax-based corrosion inhibitor.

### **i** Info

Corrosion inhibitor must not come in contact with the brake discs as this would greatly reduce the braking force.

- Clean the chain. (📖 p. 83)

## 20.1 Storage

**Warning**

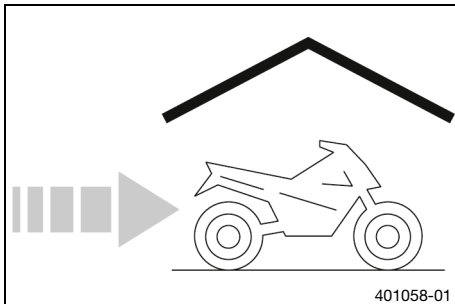
**Danger of poisoning** Fuel is harmful to health.

- Avoid skin, eye and clothing contact with fuel.
- Immediately consult a doctor if you swallow fuel.
- Do not inhale fuel vapors.
- Rinse the affected area immediately with plenty of water in the event of contact with the skin.
- Rinse the eyes thoroughly with water, and consult a doctor in case of fuel contact with the eyes.
- Change your clothing if fuel spills on them.
- Keep fuels correctly in a suitable canister, and out of the reach of children.

**Info**

If you plan to garage the motorcycle for a longer period, perform the following steps or have them performed.

Before storing the motorcycle, check all parts for function and wear. If service, repairs, or replacements are necessary, you should do this during the storage period (less workshop overload). In this way, you can avoid long workshop waiting times at the start of the new season.



- When refueling for the last time before taking the motorcycle out of service, add fuel additive.
- Refuel. (📖 p. 47)

**Tip**

Fill the fuel tank completely as specified, using fuel with the lowest possible ethanol content.

- Clean the motorcycle. (📖 p. 141)
- Change the engine oil and oil filter, clean the oil screen. 🛠️ (📖 p. 137)
- Check the antifreeze and coolant level. (📖 p. 126)
- Check tire pressure. (📖 p. 114)

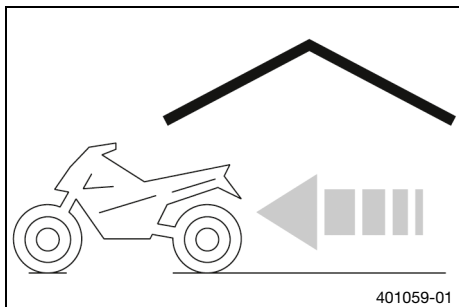
Husqvarna Motorcycles recommends jacking up the motorcycle.

- Raise the motorcycle with a lift stand. (📖 p. 60)
- Preferably cover the motorcycle with a tarp or similar cover that is permeable to air. Do not use non-porous materials since they prevent humidity from escaping, thus causing corrosion.

### **i** Info

Avoid running the engine for a short time only. Since the engine cannot warm up properly, the water vapor produced during combustion condenses and causes valves and the exhaust system to rust.

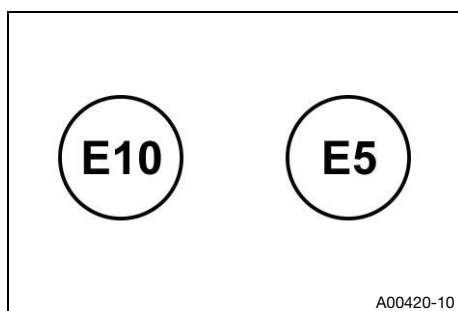

### JASO T903 MA2

Different technical development directions required a separate specification for motorcycles – the **JASO T903 MA2** standard.

Earlier, engine oils from the automobile industry were used for motorcycles because there was no separate motorcycle specification.

Whereas long service intervals are demanded for automobile engines, the focus for motorcycle engines is on high performance at high engine speeds.

In most motorcycle engines, the transmission and clutch are lubricated with the same oil.

The **JASO T903 MA2** standard meets these special requirements.

### SAE

The SAE viscosity classes were defined by the Society of Automotive Engineers and are used for classifying oils according to their viscosity. The viscosity describes only one property of oil and says nothing about quality.
